

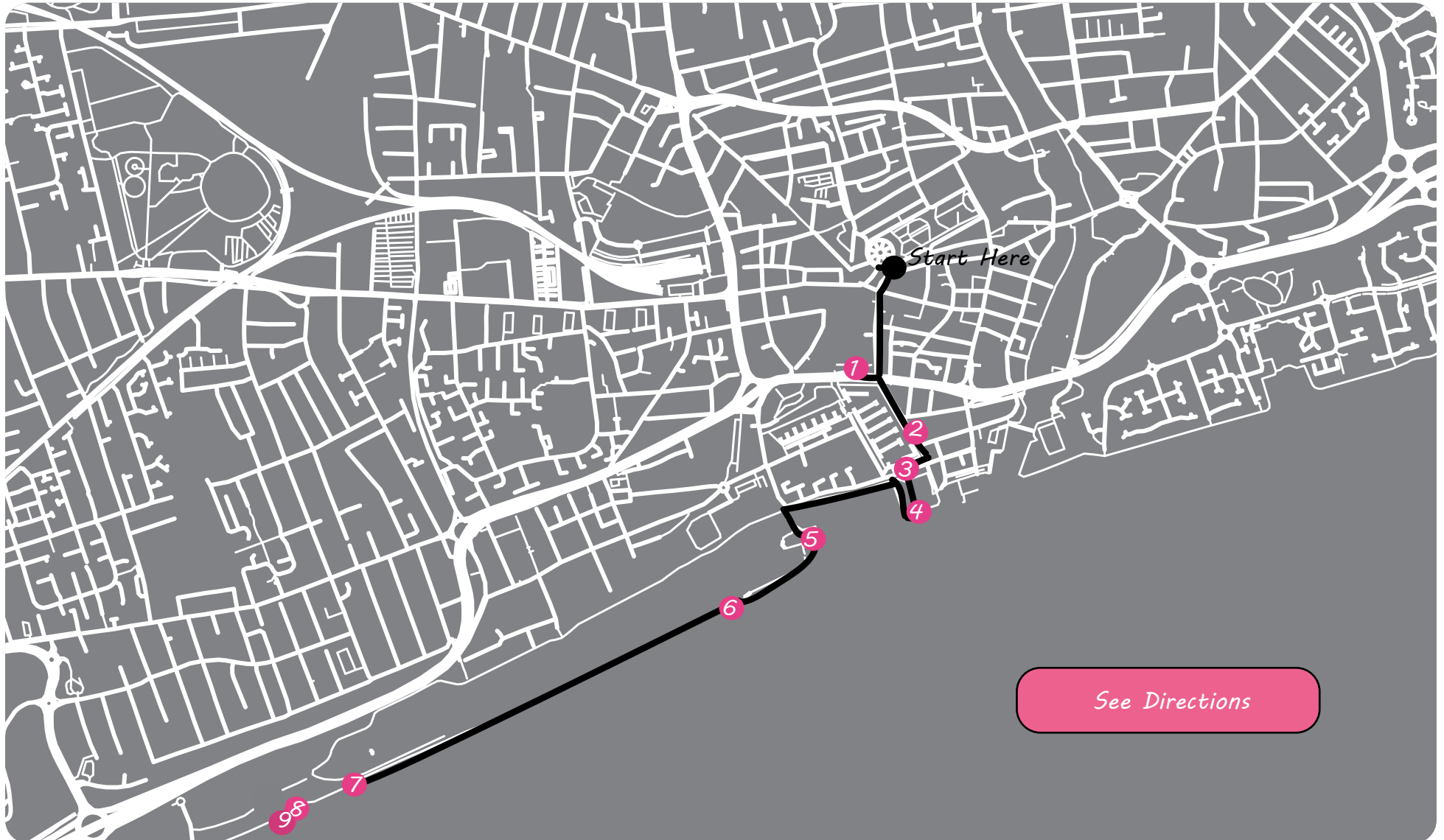

Lord Line Walk



Lord Line Walk

Click on the markers to learn about your location



- 1 The walk starts at The Rosebowl. To start the walk, stand facing the fountain with The Warren behind you and start walking right towards and beyond Princes Quay. Continue down Princes Dock Street and on the right you will find the Murdoch Connection Footbridge, our next point.
- 2 Make your way across the bridge. There are ramps to the right of the bridge for those who may find stairs difficult. Turn left and then immediately right, following the rail around the marina. Make sure you take a moment to check out some of the boats. See our next point for more information about a particular one.
- 3 Follow the handrail around the marina and turn right towards the small footbridge crossing. Before walking over it, look to your right to see the Cat Zero Yacht.
- 4 Take care as you cross the footbridge across the entrance lock of the marina. Buggies and Wheelchairs might struggle, but you can gain access by turn left after the Murdoch crossing and walking around the marine that way. once across, turn left and walk towards the water.
- 5 *Accessibility:* From this point on, this walk is no longer accessible for wheelchairs. However, please take some time to explore the Marina further. Turn back and walk down Wellington Street West until you get to the roundabout at the end. It will look like you can go no further, but look for the Trans Pennine Trail sign and turn left into Albert and William Wright Dock. Follow the marked path round until you get to a footbridge crossing.
- 6 Walk across the bridge and follow the path round until you get to some steps. Ascend them and follow the walkway until the steps take you back down onto the main path that runs alongside the Estuary.
- 7 Continue on this straight path until the next point on the map.
- 8 Continue straight along the path until you reach the Lord Line Buildings.
- 9 There is an accessible path that continues straight along the riverside. If you continue straight you will reach the Lord Lines Buildings on your right.
- 10 Explore the area, but take care with your footing and do not go into the old buildings. If you walk around to the left towards the water, you will see the Old Fisherman's Memorial.
- 11 This is the end of our route. In order to get back to the city centre, follow the exact route you came.

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Murdoch Connection Footbridge

Opening in 2021, the Murdoch Connection was named after Hull's first female GP, Mary Murdoch. It was named by students from Newland School for Girls. The bridge links Hull City Centre to the Marina. From its lowest point it stands 47 metres tall, which is 2 metres taller than Hull Minster. It weighs 150 tonnes and is 60 metre long.

There is a plaque about Marry Murdoch situated by the ramp, if you use the stairs you may miss it



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Spurn Lightship

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Neil Hadlock's Sculpture

The Neil Hadlock's Sculpture depicts a family from Northern Europe having left ship before continuing to Paragon Station then going by train to Liverpool, then ship to America. This represents the history of Hull as a major port for immigration. Accessibility: From this point on, this walk is no longer accessible for wheelchairs. However, please take some time to explore the Marina further.



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Albert Dock Footbridge

The Albert Dock Lock gates allow people to walk safely across the expanse of Albert Dock and is part of the Trans Pennine Trial walk.



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Riverside Path

Take a moment to look out over the expanse of brown water. Although the water in the estuary is very clean, it contains particles of boulder clay, giving it a brown tinge. Across the water, is the North Lincolnshire coast



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Wildlife In The Esturay

Looking out over the Estuary you may spot some local wildlife. It is home to many different species of birds as well as grey seals, porpoise and river lamprey, providing safe feeding and roosting grounds to 150,000 wildfowl.



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Lord Line Building

The buildings that surround you used to be the offices to the Lord Line Trawler Company, which was the world's largest deep water fishing fleet. After closing in 1975 it has remained empty, however you will notice that local artists like to use the space for graffiti and street art.

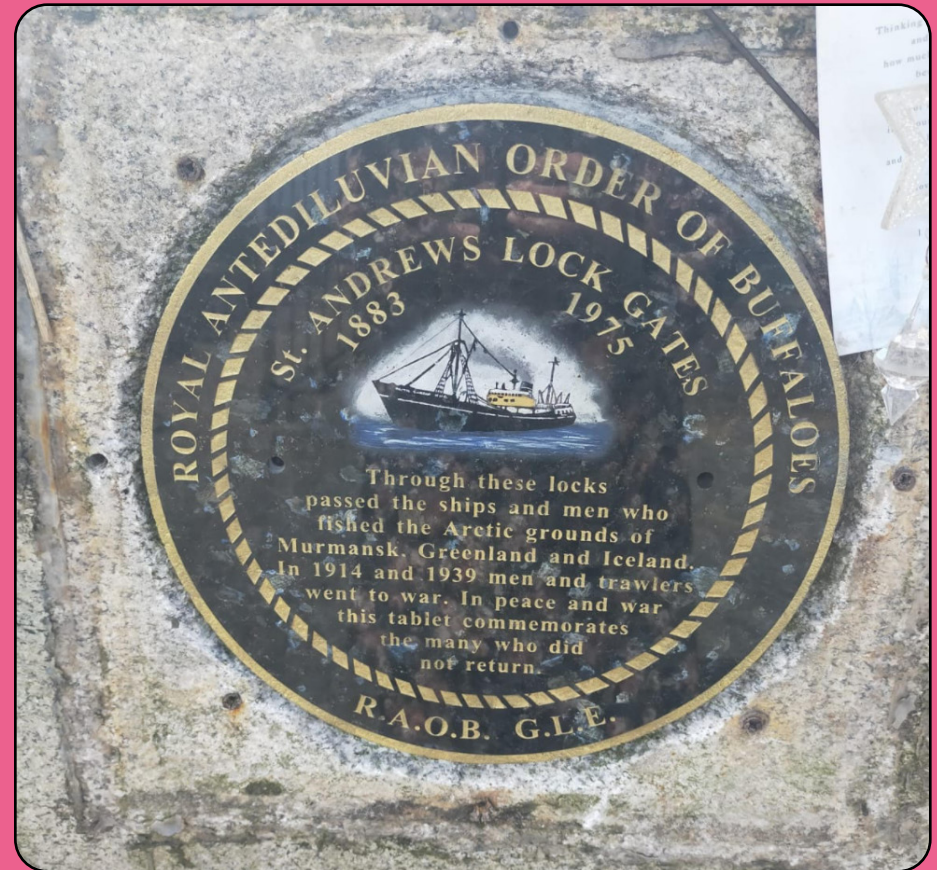


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Old Fisherman's Memorial

The fisherman's memorial that can be seen is the location of an old one, the new one can be seen further along the path. It depicts the estimated 6000 lost trawler men who left this dock and lost their lives at sea. Its hope was that families and friends of those who suffered loss could use this fitting place to remember them, and that is why there is still remnants of the memorial here.



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
